ORIGIN Shelbyville, Ind., c. 1949.
ORIGINAL USE Immediately after World War II, most American appliance manufacturers were owned by automotive companies. Stoves typically sported bumper-like curves and chrome fixtures.

DETAILS Considered the Cadillac of stoves, this Chambers C-90 stove has its original Freedom Red paint, pop-up broiler, child-proof handles, and hidden slow cooker. The C model was popular from the late 1940s through the late 1950s.
